Gospel

John said to Jesus, 'Master, we saw a man who is not one of us casting out devils in your name; and because he was not one of us we tried to stop him.' But Jesus said, 'You must not stop him: no one who works a miracle in my name is likely to speak evil of me. Anyone who is not against us is for us. 'If anyone gives you a cup of water to drink just because you belong to Christ, then I tell you solemnly, he will most certainly not lose his reward. 'But anyone who is an obstacle to bring down one of these little ones who have faith, would be better thrown into the sea with a great millstone round his neck. And if your hand should cause you to sin, cut it off; it is better for you to enter into life crippled, than to have two hands and go to hell, into the fire that cannot be put out. And if your foot should cause you to sin, cut it off; it is better for you to enter into life lame, than to have two feet and be thrown into hell. And if your eye should cause you to sin, tear it out; it is better for you to enter into the kingdom of God with one eye, than to have two eyes and be thrown into hell where their worm does not die nor their fire go out.'

Homily (Fr Thomas)

'Do not stop him...for whoever is not against us, is for us'

You can just imagine it can't you? John running up breathlessly to Jesus, desperate to tell Him the good news. They've stopped someone working in Jesus' name – someone not part of their group – and are expecting credit from the Lord for putting a stop to it. John, and the rest of Jesus' closest disciples, haven't been doing particularly well recently: they've just been caught in awkward, embarrassed silence by Jesus when He asks why they are arguing (although of course He knows) – as you'll recall from last week, it was petty

jealousies about who was the greatest of them which had cause their bickering. Just before that, Mark recounts how Jesus has foretold His betrayal and His Resurrection, but again the disciples have failed to understand what He is saying; and this incomprehension comes hot on the heels of their previous failure to cast a demon out of a sick child. It seems that they just can't do anything right.

But here is a chance to make up some ground! To win back some approval from their master and teacher! They have found someone performing works in the name of their Lord – works that, no doubt very frustratingly, they had been unable to do themselves. "Ah ha!" they think: this man is not one of us. He isn't part of our group, he doesn't have the right to perform these miracles – so we can put a stop to this right away. Surely, they think, Jesus will be pleased at their vigilance. They can make up for their earlier errors. But no. He is not pleased. Once again, this group of grumbling Galileans have got it wrong: they have again behaved like little children, but in the very worst way. Not, as Fr Nick explained to us last week, in the way we all should be – trusting, open and hopeful: full of faith and wonder. But rather they have been *childish*: they've been stubborn and squabbled, and now they are running to tell tales about someone doing something good, just because he's not one of them.

Here, not for the first time nor for the last, Our Lord is called on to rebuke His followers: 'you must not stop him...anyone who is not against us, is for us'. So Jesus makes clear to them, and to us, the true nature of the Good News and of His ministry. It is not narrow or exclusive, not small or limited: it is generous, it is expansive, it is open to all. The love He bears and the redemption that He brings are for everyone: difficult as it is for them to hear, He works – or can work – *through* anyone. Likewise, following Jesus is for everyone, not just a select few who are in the know, or have been doing so for a long time. These things, these qualities, that Jesus emphasises in His rebuke to John – generosity, openness, inclusivity – are not just hallmarks of His ministry in 1st century Galilee but should be hallmarks of His Church at all times and in all places.

For the job of the disciples then, just like us as disciples now, is not to build barriers or create obstacles to coming to Jesus; its not to act as jealous gatekeepers of His mercy and redeeming love. It is the complete and total opposite: it is to make known this love and mercy to everyone, to as many people as we possibly can. To share the incredible joy that we have at knowing how much we are loved by God, to invite others into that joy, into the life of the Risen Christ which we inhabit as members of His Body the Church.

Yet the attitude of John and of the other disciples can all too often be replicated today, sometimes intentionally, sometimes not. Either way, it is something for which we all need to be on our guard: to make sure that we are not putting barriers between others and the Lord. To make sure that we are facing outwards to the world, warm and welcoming, not falling inwards on ourselves insular and exclusive. Throughout history this has been a weakness of the Church, and things have been made especially difficult over the past two years of the COVID pandemic: a fearful time of closed doors and covered faces. Government restrictions and episcopal decisions have caused many to feel – or indeed to be – excluded from the Church, whether from praying and worshipping in Her buildings, from finding solace in these houses of prayer or joining together in joy and celebration to be nourished at the altar.

Thankfully those days are, please God, behind us: but the task of extending welcome, of removing barriers to those who seek the Lord and going out to encourage and draw in the rest, remains as necessary as ever. It has always been a daunting one, and now especially so. We face it together, priests and people, clergy and laity; united in our love for the Lord and for our neighbours, guided and encouraged by the Holy Spirit and confident in the tender care of our Father, with whom all things are possible.

So it is an extremely exciting time to be arriving here at Christ Church, at this turning of the tide as we look to the future with hope and optimism. I look forward immensely to sharing with you all in the mission of this church and the wider Church to share God's love with our neighbours here in this parish and town, and beyond. To play our part in bringing that hope which Jesus offers into the lives of others – so many of whom have been living in shadow and darkness these past few years especially. You will see in your pew sheets that next Saturday 2nd October Bishop Will, the Bishop of Lewes, is hosting a Walsingham Festival Day in Brighton 'Renewing Hope' where Christians from across the diocese are invited to gather together in joyful celebration and preparation to go out once more into our parishes and towns with

enthusiasm. I hope that many of you will join us there from 11.00am at St Paul's – do speak to me if you'd like to know more. In the meantime, let us all pray for renewed hope in our lives, in our parish and in the wider Church: hope in the Gospel, hope in the Lord, hope in His promise of the heaven where all are welcome in His name. Amen.
